John DeFillipo Biography 2014

John DeFillipo, Director of the John Bunker Sands Wetland Center, is an engaging naturalist with over 18 years of experience blending ecological concepts with business insights. After receiving his BS degree in Business Administration in 1992 from the Mississippi University for Women, he pursued a naturalist career with two nature centers in the southeastern United States; Camp McDowell Environmental Education Center in Alabama and Crow's Neck Environmental Education Center in Mississippi. In 2002, John refined his focus as an Outreach Educator with the Mississippi Museum of Natural Science where he presented endangered species programs, including live Alligators. While living in Mississippi, John served as the president of the Mississippi Environmental Education Alliance and was the recipient of the 2008 Environmental Educator of the Year Award.

John moved to Dallas in late 2008 to accept the Lead Natural Science Educator position with the Perot Museum of Nature and Science before becoming the Director of the Wetland Center in March 2010. Currently, John serves as a board director for the Association of Nature Center Administrators (ANCA) and the Crandall Independent School District's Education Foundation.

Through his enduring passion of man's stewardship of the Earth, he envisions leading the Wetland Center to become a premier example of environmental education with a strong focus on habitat and water conservation, public education, partnerships, and wetland research.

Heard Herd Member Photography Tips for 2015

From Elinor Hite:

"Did someone give you a drone for Christmas? The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) has posted online an informative video and rules for flying drones. You can see more on this topic under the heading *What the FAA Wants You to Know Before You Fly Your Drone*. Please note their rule: "Do not conduct surveillance or photograph persons or areas where there is an expectation of privacy without the individual's permission."

From Peggy Evans:

"Larry I like the idea of what to do to improve photography - Not only go on club workshops but find a photo buddy that is learning too or has better skills and go out adventuring together. It is a great way to see things differently and to share learning many skills. It is the mentor idea."

From Ron Marabito:

"Something I've just started doing myself a lot of the time. Shoot in manual and make sure you meter on your subject. Amazing how well your exposures turn out. My Bald Eagle that was posted on facebook and sent to a list of followers via email was shot that way in mid-day sun. I've attached it just in case. The background was replaced because the surroundings for the shot were awful."

"Tip: Become aware of the light, what color it is, how strong it is, and which way it falls on your subject. Decide if you need to change your position to allow the light to enhance your subject. Or should you consider shooting at a different time of day?"

Jack Harrison passed along the following from Tim Grey's site because the club has a new projector:

"Our club has a good quality digital projector but some people are not always happy with how their images look when projected. Would it make a substantial difference if we took the extra step of calibrating it or will we always see a difference between the projected image and the display on a calibrated monitor?"

Tim's Answer:

"Calibrating and profiling your digital projector will indeed have a tremendous impact on the accuracy and consistency of the display of projected images.

Put simply, if all club members calibrate the monitor display they use for reviewing and optimizing their photos, and you calibrate the projector being used to display the images at your club meetings, you can expect a very good match between what the photographer created on their own computer and what is being displayed by your projector.

The key is to make sure everyone is calibrating to the same target values. For example, you could specify that everyone should calibrate to a color target of 6500 Kelvin and luminance of 100 candelas per square meter (cd/m2). If everyone uses the same values, you will achieve a high degree of consistency across multiple displays.

To actually calibrate the digital projector, you'll need a monitor calibration package that supports digital projectors as well as standard displays. One such package that works very well is the X-Rite ColorMunki Display package".

"The Printer From Hell" By Larry Genender

I have always lived by the motto "always buy the biggest and best, otherwise you wind up with two". While taking Photoshop classes at Richland College, I learned to print on an Epson 4880, which has roll paper as well as cut sheet capacity – it can print any size as long as one dimension is 17 inches or less. I was determined to have this printer, and when a sale came along that gave it to me at a 50% discount, I took the plunge. The newest model is the 4900. The big secret is that the ink is the thing that costs big bucks – eleven colors at \$100 each for a 200 cc cartridge (they do last a long time).

The unit weighs 130 pounds and is bulky. It takes 2 people to lift it. I did a lot of moving around in my study to make room and finally got it installed. It made some great prints (including some poster sized ones) before it broke down, and I had to have it replaced – a faulty sensor in the paper feed mechanism. That was just bad luck with a new printer.

These high-end printers use pigment rather than dye inks, making the nozzles on the print head more prone to clog. Pigment-based inks make better prints whose colors are more permanent than do dye-based inks. Infrequent use makes clogged nozzles more likely to occur. Recently I had a major clog, one that I couldn't fix myself. I spent a lot of ink trying, and realized that I had to find a repairman who would come to the house and fix it. I finally found a company who provided that service, and in due course the tech arrived. It took him 2 ½ hours (at \$150/hr.) to unclog it. It was touch and go for a while whether he could; if he couldn't, I would have to replace the print head at prohibitive cost. In any case, the printer works perfectly, and he showed me how to prevent this in the future – run a test pattern once weekly, and unclog any nozzle(s) that weren't perfect. I was thrilled.

In the end, all is well. The printer works perfectly, and I know how to look after it. I should have bought the smaller model 3880, which does almost everything I ever will want. Unlike many of us, I actually enjoy printing. I have learned that there are exceptions to the rule about always buying "the biggest and the best".
