Bosque del Apache National Wildlife Refuge is just south of San Antonio, New Mexico along Interstate 25, about 90 miles south of Albuquerque. Bosque is a managed refuge and they plant corn for the cranes and

geese to feed on plus they have an intricate water system where they can draw water from the Rio Grande River to maintain levels for the waterfowl and wildlife that migrate through the refuge and also for those that live there all year.

Sandhills stand 34-42" tall and have a wingspan of 73-90" depending on their age. They travel as far south as the Gulf of Mexico from their breeding grounds on the Arctic tundra and marshes. Several thousand cranes and geese winter at Bosque del Apache from mid-November thru the end of January when they head north again.

There are several ponds on State Highway 1 leading to the Bosque Visitor Center and refuge and the cranes and geese often overnight in these shallow ponds to avoid predators. This pair had just taken off to head to the fields of corn. Their very distinct voices can be heard as they feed and as they fly together, continually calling out to each other. As they prepare to takeoff, they lean forward into the wind, take a few running steps across the water or on the ice if the pond is frozen and with wings spread, they take flight.

For this image I used my Nikon D800e with my Nikon 70-200mm f2.8 lens and a 2X tele-extender. I shot it at 1/2000 sec, f5.6 at ISO 500 on December 12, 2012 at 9:45 a.m.

Hagerman NWR Field Trip

We had 12 members come up to Hagerman NWR for sunrise on December 19. Since there were no clouds, we turned our attention to the several thousand geese that were resting in the lake near Meyers Low Water Crossing. We were treated to a thrilling (and noisy) mass takeoff as they flew to greener pastures to feed for the day. As we moved down Wildlife Drive we found Pintails and Mallards greeting the sun and American Coots seemed to be everywhere.

A flock of 30 White Pelicans resting and preening above water on a bar near Tern pad road gave us great photo ops while several Ring-billed Gulls were nearby. A lovely Great Blue Heron was hunting breakfast and posed long enough for reflection shots. We spotted a beaver swimming in the lake and several deer pranced through the forest on Bennett and Sandy Point Roads. Cardinals darted along the road and a huge hawk flew off before I could even stop the car. The owls were illusive so we just have to go back!

Sue Malnory, President of the Friends of Hagerman group, gave us a nice presentation and slideshow in the Visitor Center and provided hot coffee and treats for us. Seven of us met for lunch at Cracker Barrel in Sherman.



FUTURE FIELD TRIPS

January 13-17, 2016: Bosque del Apache NWR, San Antonio, NM

A trip to photograph the wildlife at Bosque including Sandhill Cranes, Snow Geese, hawks, bald eagles, waterfowl, deer and feral hogs.

Nineteen members are signed up for this trip. If you want to go, please let me know and make your lodging reservations now. We'll have group dinners Friday and Saturday nights in Socorro.



February 27, 2016: Heard Nature Sanctuary, McKinney, TX,

We will meet at 9 a.m. on the deck outside the back door of the visitor center. Be sure to sign in at the Visitor Center desk and pay your entry fee if you are not a member of the Heard Nature and Science Museum. This is an opportunity to photograph the Trout Lilies also known as Dogtooth Violet, Eastern Trout-lily, and Adder's Tongue but are of the lily family. A perennial flower with mottled leaves found growing in a colony along the Hoot Owl Trail. The Sycamore Trail and the Wood Duck Trail also offer photo opportunities for those who want to stretch their legs. We'll plan to meet for lunch.

March 26 - April 2, 2016: High Island, Upper Texas Gulf Coast.

Opportunity for photographing shorebirds, the rookery with egrets, heron and roseate spoonbills. We'll visit Anahuac NWR and other local areas as well at check out the Bolivar Peninsula.

Lodging in available in High Island and Winnie or you may rent a beach house in or near High Island. Come for all or part of the week for sunshine, sunrises, sunsets, beach walks and the sound of the waves.

April 16, 2016: White Rock Lake, Dallas

A walk with Robert Bunch to look for owls, waterfowl, birds, and spring flowers.

May 7, 2016: Dallas Arboretum, Spring Blooms, water features

<u>June 18, 2016</u>: Hagerman NWR Butterfly Garden, Harris Creek Trail, drive through the refuge to photograph waterfowl

<u>July 16-23, 2016</u>: TBD - Possible options: Great Sand Dunes, Pagosa Springs, Durango/Silverton areas of Colorado

August 6, 2016: Tabletop workshop at the SRC, Heard

September 13-18, 2016: Perhaps another trip to the Wichita Mountains NWR?

October 25-30, 2016: Fall foliage in the Ozarks, Northern Arkansas or Caddo Lake in East Texas

November 19, 2016: John Bunker Hunt Sands Wetlands

<u>December 17, 2016</u>: Ft. Worth Japanese Gardens for fall foliage

JANUARY PROGRAM


MIKE MEZEUL

CONTEST CATEGORIES – ADULT DIVISIONS

- Adult Beginner/Intermediate
- Adult Advanced
 Comfortable with the technical aspects of the camera. Proficient in the concepts of composition, exposure, lighting and post-processing techniques for creating images. May be skillful in more than one genre of photography (for example: landscape, portrait, macro, photojournalism, still life, etc.)

ANIMALS - CAPTIVE

Images of animals in a controlled setting (i.e. farm, zoo, ranch, etc.). May include mammals, marine life, reptiles and amphibians. Does not include pets.

ANIMALS - WILD

Non-captive animals.

BIRDS

Wild or captive birds.

CREATIVE INTERPRETATION

Nature-related images intended to express the photographer's impression of the subject (i.e. creative blurs, abstract and digital manipulation.) Not to be judged on amount of manipulation but on artistic end result.

FLORAL AND STILL LIFE IN NATURE

Images of natural or cultivated flowers, plants or gardens.

INSECTS & ARACHNIDS

Wild or captive insects and arachnids.

NATURAL ARTISTIC ABSTRACTIONS IN NATURE

Naturally occurring patterns, lines, shapes and forms of animals, objects, or plants in nature; also may include macro and extreme close-up images in cases where the patterns, lines, shapes, etc. are the principal subject.

SCENICS

Expansive views that may include landscapes, cloudscapes, mountains, forests, deserts, etc. Nature should be the subject of the image.

WATERSCAPES

Images primarily featuring water such as seascapes, oceans, waterfalls, lakes, streams and rivers. Water is to be the primary subject.

Note: It is the responsibility of the photographer to read through the category descriptions carefully and choose the appropriate category for each image. The photographer's selection will be final. Anything not meeting the criteria will be ineligible for judging

<u>CONTEST CATEGORIES – YOUTH DIVISIONS</u>

- Junior Youth Up to age 14
- **Senior Youth** Age 15 18

NOTE: In all categories, the "hand of man" is acceptable as long as it is incidental and not the subject of the image. *This is a change from previous years.*

ANIMALS (including Pets)

Images of animals in a controlled setting (i.e. farm, zoo, ranch, etc.). May include mammals, marine life, reptiles and amphibians

ANIMALS - WILD

Non-captive animals.

BIRDS

Wild or captive birds.

CREATIVE INTERPRETATION

Nature-related images intended to express the photographer's impression of the subject (i.e. creative blurs, abstract and digital manipulation.) Not to be judged on amount of manipulation but on artistic end result.

FLORAL AND STILL LIFE IN NATURE

Images of natural or cultivated flowers, plants or gardens.

INSECTS & ARACHNIDS

Wild or captive insects and arachnids.

WATERSCAPES & SCENICS

Expansive views that may include seascapes, oceans, waterfalls, lakes, streams, rivers, landscapes, cloudscapes, mountains, forests, deserts, etc. Nature should be the subject of the image.
