All were imported in to Photoshop for some tweaks. Mother Nature sure provides us with interesting colors, textures and shapes!

As the weather gets hot, here is an indoor project for you to try. Look through some of your images and reedit a couple to reveal the essence -- the "picture within the picture". Identify your subject and crop-in tighter than your previous edits to further eliminate distractions. Crop-out, darken, or blur bright areas, diverging lines, etc. in order to increase the image impact. You should be able to describe and home-in on what you like in an image: "I like the swirl of the snail's shell and his gooey trail on top of the colorful cone flower". I cropped-out the rest (other flowers and darkened the distracting background).

For those you know who may be suffering, lonely or ill, you might send some of your images with them to brighten their day! I know that Peggy Evans (club member, former officer) said it made her smile!

JULY PROGRAM

Tom Savage, APSA, MPSA



Tom has been involved with photography in one form or another since 7th grade when his uncle gave him a cheap Japanese copy of a Roleiflex camera. He spent the next summer at a friend's ranch in southern California photographing movie companies filming western TV series like Wild Bill Hickok, the Cisco Kid, and Annie Oakley.

However, he didn't really get serious with photography as a hobby until 1983 when he joined the Lockheed Martin (then General Dynamics) Recreation Association Camera Club. He is also a member of the Fort Worth Camera Club and the Photographic Society of America (PSA). His favorite photography subjects are nature and photojournalism.

Since 2004 in both Nature and Photojournalism, he has won 28 Best of Show medals and 86 other medals in 11 different countries. He won Best of Show in the Heard Museum's Nature Photography Contest three times, and has had three images published in Cowboys & Indians Magazine. Among many other honors, he won the Grand Prize in Robin Pope Safari's photography contest and was awarded a free safari in Zambia. In 2008, one of his images was the Photographic Society of America's Nature Image of the Year.

He loves to photograph wildlife. He has been to Alaska to photograph grizzly bears five times, to Zambia four times, and Tanzania three times.

June Field Trip to the Hagerman NWR

As we arrived, we were lucky to see a couple of dozen Canada Geese on the lake near the Visitor Center. We walked Harris Creek Trail where the wildflowers were still in bloom, birds filled the woods with their songs and lake waters overflowed the creek bed.

Jimmy Lee and I walked out to the three ponds and were pleasantly surprised by a deer jumping across the trail right in front of us! The new butterfly garden is lush and green but those little butterflies are fast! Dragonflies, bees, grasshoppers and other insects enjoy the flowers and water features and can be found by those with patience and good eyesight!

The Friends of Hagerman volunteer docents also braved the heat and humidity to share their knowledge of pollinators and flowers.

To cool off and get out of the heat, we watched a film on the Monarch migration from Canada and the northern U.S. to Mexico and back and marveled at the ability of the fourth generation Monarchs to find their way back to the mountains of Mexico.

Several club members enjoyed brunch at Cracker Barrel in Sherman at the end of the trip.

<u>August 6</u> - Tabletop Workshop at the Science Resource Center at the Heard Museum and Nature Center from 10:00 a.m to 4:00 p.m. This is a chance to learn some new photography techniques and have a hands on opportunity to work with some of our most experienced photographers. Bring your tripod, camera, medium (24-70mm range) and macro lenses, remote control shutter release, charged batteries, memory cards and your questions and curiosity.

GSCCC NEWS

As a member club in the Gulf States Camera Club Council (GSCCC), we may submit a total of 4 images from 4 different members to each Projected Nature contest. The contests are held every May, July, September, November, and Feburary. I maintain a collection of images to pick from for use in future competitions. If you would like to participate, please send me copies of your best nature photos. Please follow these guidelines from the GSCCC Web Site: "Nature photography is restricted to the use of the photographic process to depict observations from all branches of natural history, except anthropology and archeology, in such a fashion that a well-informed person will be able to identify the subject material and to certify as to its honest presentation.

The story telling value of a photograph must be weighed more than the pictorial quality while maintaining high technical quality. Human elements shall not be present, except where those human elements enhance the nature story. The presence of scientific bands, scientific tags or radio collars on wild animals is permissible.

Photographs of artificially produced hybrid plants or animals, mounted specimens, or obviously set arrangements, are ineligible, as is any form of manipulation that alters the truth of the photographic statement.

No techniques that add to, relocate, replace, or remove pictorial elements except by cropping are permitted. Techniques that enhance the presentation of the photograph without changing the nature story or the pictorial content are permitted. All adjustments must appear natural. Color images can be converted to grayscale monochrome. Infrared images are not allowed."

Files should be resized to no more than 1024 (wide) x 768 (high) and the file name should include the title of the image and the name of the maker. Please do not put your name or copyright on the image itself. Attach files to an email and send to Lpetterborg@gmail.com.
