

November Educational Workshop – Denise Remfert



Denise will be our guest lecturer for our Educational series that takes place on the morning of our next club meeting – November 10 from 10:00a – 12:00 noon. Her presentation will give you an insight in the various ways digital photography, along with your own imagination and creativity, can allow you to transform your images and take them to a new level.

The session will begin with basic techniques you will find immediately useful. It then progresses in difficulty and complexity through a survey of processing techniques using Photoshop, Lightroom, and Plug-In filters like Topaz and hand painting in Photoshop. She hopes you will enjoy seeing the potential you have at your disposal once you play with the magic of the pixel.

Handouts will be given for the session - you do not need to bring your computer.

Denise joined the Heard Nature Photographers Club in 2003 as a novice after viewing the photo contest. Her first contest images garnered a place at the back of the room in a dark corner. Determined to find out how to get images in print that came closer to what she desired has led her to many classes, workshops and competitions. There is always more to learn, but it is so much fun!

November Guest Speaker – Brad Smith




Our guest speaker for our November meeting is Brad Smith, a Dallas-based photographer, who also happens to have a day job. His specialties are cityscapes, aerial photography, and time-lapse creation.

Brad has taken pictures of cityscapes, sunrises, sunsets, thunderstorm ripping in from clear skies, the moon dancing over city streets, firework displays, and the stars sprawling overhead in stunning hyper-motion. His photography has taken him across the United States, from New York to San Francisco, and especially home across Texas.

His presentation will reveal how close you already are or may be to planning your own time-lapse creations *(think dark skies with star trails, storms with lightening, beaches with waves coming in, or animals in nature, to name but a few)*. He will review what you will need to get started, the fundamentals of planning a shot, and discuss his perpetually evolving ideas about what compels time-lapse footage to come alive.

Field Trips

November – Japanese Garden – Fort Worth

Saturday, November 24, 2018

8:00 am

Fall Color, Reflections, Formal Japanese Gardens -- Lots to Enjoy!



This is a date change from the originally announced November date. I talked with the event scheduling person and it looks like November 17th is now loaded with several weddings throughout the day, morning included. Thus, we will be going on November 24th. I know this is Thanksgiving weekend so hopefully the change will work for you. *If you go ahead and go on a different date, of course, I will continue to include your images in our slide show. You can note on the sign-up sheet that you are going on a different day.*

Web site for the Japanese Garden: <u>http://www.fwbg.org/the-japanese-garden/</u> When I last checked the web site, it had not been updated to reflect the current winter hours. I am assured that they will be open at 8 am in Nov. So it's early to bed after your Black Friday shopping!!

The Fort Worth Japanese Garden was completed in 1973. It is a traditional stroll garden with winding paths through the landscapes and around ponds. The Garden consists of 7.5 acres filled with cherry trees, Japanese maples, magnolias, bamboo, bridges, and ponds which are home to over 1,200 Koi fish. Except in the spring, there are few flowers blooming in the Japanese Garden due to the Japanese practice of Mono no Aware. Mono no Aware translates to transient/bittersweet beauty, meaning if the garden was always blooming it would never be special.



We should be at or about the peak of fall color in the Garden. Consider using a polarizer to enhance the colors and reduce spectral glare (blown out highlights) from the leaves. If I am using the polarizer with quite a wide angle lens, I watch to make sure that I don't get dark banding, particularly in the sky. A monopod or a lens with vibration reduction will aid with the slower shutter speeds caused by the polarizer. Typically, wide angle lenses work well in

gardens of this nature. However, the normal lens and short telephoto will have their places especially for details and close-ups. (My fisheye lens is already packed in my bag.) *Image from Japanese Garden web site to gives an idea of what we might expect.*

Garden etiquette requires that we stay on designated walkways and trails and not step into shrub beds, etc. It is important that we do not create congestion, blocking the general public, and that we regularly check to be sure that we have not stepped into another photographer's field of view.

Although tripods are allowed in the general Botanical Gardens area, they are <u>not allowed in the Japanese</u> <u>Garden</u>. <u>Monopods are okay in the Japanese Garden – Tripods are not</u>. Any photos that we take cannot be used for commercial purposes and are only for our personal and internal club use.

December – Hagerman National Wildlife Refuge

Saturday December 1st

Early Morning Trip – Time to be announced.

This is a great opportunity to photograph Snow Geese during their annual migration south. The Refuge plants wheat every year for the purpose of attracting and feeding the Snow Geese. Timing is dependent upon the bird migration and how fast they eat up the grain. Thus, <u>the date may have to be adjusted to accommodate the winter vacation plans of the geese.</u>

Note: Due to flooding from Lake Texoma, roads and the wheat fields have flooded. As of this writing, roads in the refuge are currently closed. It is possible the planted wheat fields may not be productive as a result of the flooding. That being the case, the geese may spend a lot of time flying from the refuge to nearby farmer's fields. I will be keeping in touch with the refuge and keep those signed up informed as to the presence of geese and accessibility.

It is a little bit of a drive to the preserve. We will probably leave fairly early in the morning. It is about 62 miles and a one hour drive from my home in the south part of Plano. The refuge is found by traveling north on Hwy 75; west on US 82 for 5 miles; north on Hwy 289 for 4 miles; then west on Refuge Rd for 4 miles. Or just head out 289 north to Refuge Rd. There will be a map in the packet that I send out a few days before the trip.

A long telephoto is certainly an advantage, but other lenses will work also. A tripod and a polarizing filter will

be handy, but not absolutely necessary.

Here is a shot I got last December. This was shot on a crop frame Fuji X-T2 with a 100-400 mm telephoto lens.

Looks like US Hwy 75 northbound during the afternoon commute!!!

So, birds in flight, birds on the ground, with Alan's help maybe an eagle shot and if we are lucky maybe other birds and wildlife.
