PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Hi everyone! By the time you read this, we will be in February already... and it's time to start looking forward to the early spring bloomers out in national/state parks, in our local communities, and even in our own backyards.

I have been working on overhauling my gardens, as well as creating new ones, in order to bring in pollinators and birds to help provide me with photographic opportunities closer to home. As I have done research into what I wanted to plant, I came across references to "pocket prairies", which are defined as: "... a small urban planting (often less than 1 acre) featuring plants native to the highly imperiled coastal prairie ecosystem of Texas and Louisiana." However, I have learned through attending various online meetings that these pocket prairies can be as small as a couple of native plants in garden pots on an apartment balcony, or as large as several acres of land.

So, I have decided to start with a 20x20 (400 sq ft) area in my back yard, and have purchased a Blackland Prairie seed mixture to lay down and plant. It contains both native prairie grasses and a rather large selection of native wildflowers. The farming and turning over of native prairie grasses and flowers have taken away a large ecosystem that provides food, cover and "nurseries" for many insects, pollinators, birds and small mammals. These pocket prairies are starting to pop-up in many communities as people are taking action to provide stop-over "B&Bs" for these critters as they complete their migrations.

I know my area will take at least one to two cycles to get established, but it makes me feel good to know that I have done something to help the bigger picture by providing some protected spaces in my little corner of the world. As nature photographers, we go out into nature to enjoy what is there... when that disappears for urban development, we should look to "give back" to nature where we can. If that is a native plant that is a host plant, a seed plant or a plant that provides cover and safety from predators, why not think about adding that to your patio or back yard? You just may be surprised with "whooooo" stops by to say hello! If you have any out of town guests, take pictures and share them with us. I certainly plan to when my little backyard B&B is open for business!

Until then, there are always the local areas that are also available for a quick visit and a picture or two...

FEBRUARY SPEAKER

Krispen Hartung

Topic: "Simple and Easy to Apply Principles for Creating Artistically Appealing Bird Photos"

Krispen Hartung is a 5th generation Idaho native, who was raised on a farm in a small rural town and moved to Boise, Idaho when he was 18 years old, where he attended Boise State University, built his career, and raised his family.

He took an avid interest in birds as a child, which resulted in winning a bird watching contest in Grade School at the Malheur National Wildlife Refuge, Oregon. He still has his 1st place "Bird Champ" plaque and his original bird guide, "A Field Guide to Western Birds", by Roger Tory Peterson, second edition, 1978. His favorite bird as a child was the Red-Breasted Nuthatch, which he listened to and eventually spotted at his grandparent's cabin in the mountains. After that, he was hooked.

Relatively recently, Krispen decided to rekindle his childhood passion for birds and take up bird photography. He started with a Canon EOS 7D Mark II and EF 100-400mm f/4.5/5.6L IS II USM lens. Based on his background as an artist, an intuitive understanding of the principles of aesthetics, and a knack for learning technology and software very quickly based on his early career, Krispen was able to accelerate and ramp up his photography skills in a relatively short period of time (6 months) by applying a simple set of technical and artistic principles. His current setup is a Canon EOS R5 mirrorless base, and an EF 600mm f/4L IS USM lens, which he intends to pair up with the RF 400mm f/2.8L once it is released by Canon.

Krispen still resides in Boise, Idaho and works for a regional healthcare system as a manager of Provider Wellness and coach, specializing in physician leadership, emotional intelligence, and human performance improvement. He is a single, part-time father of 15 year old fraternal twin daughters.

He will be discussing how he goes about achieving appealing bird photos. He will point out the Boise, Idaho area for birding hotspots, explain his current setup and most commonly used settings. He will also talk about the editing software he uses then provide some simple and easy to apply principles for crating artistically appealing bird photos.

It is a 14-hour flight from DFW to Tokyo. When we arrived, Japan was in the middle of a historic snowstorm but with the help graciously offered by people in the airport, on the subways and then on the street we were able to navigate to our hotel after our night arrival. Throughout the country heavy snowfall had grounded flights and stopped trains leaving a dozen people dead and thousands injured. Martin's local knowledge allowed us take local trains instead of a vehicle to our first destination. Our goal was to photograph the Japanese Macaques at what is known as Snow Monkey Park in the mountains near Nagano where the 1998 Winter Olympics were held.

The snow had closed the park, but Martin convinced them to open for us and we were able to hike a narrow-shoveled path through the snow up the mountain. The storm had taken out the system that brings volcano hot springs water to the park. But, with the monkeys not being able to get in the water we were thrilled with our unique images of them dry and playing in the deep snow and trying to stay warm.

PAYING FOR YOUR SUBMISSION

We use a manual process to download images and to bill for the entry fee. Here's what happens:

Within 24-48 hours after you submit your images, you will receive an e-mail confirmation that they have been accepted (i.e. downloaded into the submission software).

Once the download happens, a list is generated from which PayPal invoices are manually prepared and sent to the email address under which the submission was made.

From the date of the invoice, participants have 72 hours in which to make their payment.

Each invoice has a separate invoice number. Please pay only from the embedded link in the PayPal invoice. This will automatically reflect that your invoice has been paid once the transaction is complete.

Payment must be made before the images will be included in the judging.

Payments are only accepted via PayPal. Credit cards are used for making this payment.

We are set up to accept international payments.

Cash and checks will not be accepted.

Please note: Invoices for images submitted within two days of the deadline will need to be paid upon receipt.

IMAGE SPECIFICATIONS

Images submitted should be saved as JPG files. RAW files are not accepted.

Image size should be at least 2000 pixels on the long edge and save it as a JPG file at 70% - 80% quality.

No identifying information should be visible on the image.

Ensure that the image Title and Copyright are included in the metadata of the image file.

NEW! If metadata is not entered in the digital file and your images places in any category, your name and image title will not appear with our image when winners are posted on our website or displayed during the awards reception.



Aurora Over Glacial Lagoon: Debbie Nielsen, Second Prize, January GSCCC Nature Category

Aurora Over Glacial Lagoon – I decided to check off a travel destination on my bucket list and head to Iceland for a photo workshop with Thor Photography. For those that have been, you know what beauty the country holds. I visited at the end of August and did not expect to see any auroras. I felt incredibly lucky to have several nights of great displays of color. This photo was taken at Jökulsárlón (Glacier Lagoon) in the southeastern part of the country. As the Breiðamerkurjökull glacier calves, icebergs of various sizes, colors and shapes travel through a short waterway to the nearby Atlantic Ocean. We got lucky on this cold evening as the lake was full of icebergs with little wind. The sky exploded with color and beckoned us to stay as we photographed into the night. For this shot, the aurora display was not only in front of my camera as a great background, but lit up the sky above and behind me allowing me to not only catch a great background and light up the icebergs but also capture color in the water foreground.
