WHITE SANDS NATIONAL PARK, NEW MEXICO

R.E. (Ron) Marabito

Several decades ago Heard Nature Photographers established the honorary Life Membership Award to recognize and honor members who had made substantial (out of the ordinary) contributions to the photo club and to nature photography, spanning over a number of vears.

Since its inception, we have honored many, including Ron Marabito in 2011. Ron served as our President, Field Trip Coordinator, presented numerous programs and field trip presentations, and has helped fellow club members to learn more about photography.

Ron is a frequent contributor to our Facebook page with his breathtaking landscape photos. The photos are even more distinctive because of the beautiful digital borders he often adds to his images. A few years ago he presented a training lesson on creating borders which was well-received by members.

This month Ron shares his experiences and photos from southwest Texas.


This happens to be my favorite photo destination which I have visited numerous times over the last 10 years. White Sands is located 15 miles southwest of Alamogordo on Highway 70. No public bus service is available so you have to go with your own conveyance. You can fly into El Paso and rent a car or you can drive there.

White Sands is about 583 miles from Dallas and a 9 to 10 hour drive.


Alamogordo has several hotels and restaurants and also has a few campgrounds. I suggest you pick a location at the south end of town, closer to White Sands National Park.

I have not visited in the autumn months but I have been there in March, April and May. I prefer April for great skies.

Photography is mostly done early in the day or late in order to capture textures and contrast. Middle of the day is just plain white and very boring. Do something else then. I suggest visiting the Alamogordo Space Center or the Three Rivers Petroglyphs north of Alamogordo or a bit further to the Valley of Fires State Park, home of the Malpais lava flow. To the south, there is Las Cruces and the historic Spanish Village, Mesilla, founded in 1598. The village plaza has been restored to its 19th century appearance. Great place for Mexican Food. Just remember that it is 54 miles each way over the San Andres Mountains.

I suggest when you first arrive at the park, explore the visitor center and the entire loop road so you have a good feel for the area. If you want to capture a sunrise, talk to a Ranger about the paper work required along with fees. Plan to enter the park 2 hours before sunrise in order to find your spot and get set up. Scout the park during daylight because night in the park is pitch black.

Equipment: Take a wide angle lens, a telephoto and macro if you have one. This will cover just about anything you want to capture. Best to go in with 2 camera bodies to avoid lens changes in the dunes. Wear a vest or pouch rather than a backpack so nothing sets on the sand (gypsum). Use a good tripod. Use a polarizer to get great cloud images. Take a flash to accent lowlight foreground features. Make sure to take a flashlight or headlight. Bring a compass or GPS so you don't get lost Most cell phones are equipped with tracking so you can retrace your steps back to your vehicle. Make sure everything has a fresh charge. Wear high top shoes if you can to avoid shoes full of sand.

Exploration: The prevailing winds are from the south. The dunes are easy to climb on the south face and gentle. They are steep and very difficult on the north face. The south is firm and the north is very soft.

Go out at least 3 dunes from the road in order to eliminate foot prints from your images.



Newsletters are archived from 2015 through 2020.


