PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Hello everyone! During our Zoom meeting last month, Steve Earles, our Field Trip Coordinator, shared with us that he and a photo buddy had been the victim of their car being burglarized after a photo trip down to the Trinity River Levee.

The car had been parked in the Trinity Groves area parking lot. Around 5:00 pm, after spending some time taking their pictures, they decided that they would secure their camera equipment in the car and then head in to a restaurant for a bite to eat for dinner. They stowed the equipment under the seat on the floorboard of a vehicle with tinted windows. Unless you knew it was in there, it was not visible to anyone just looking into the vehicle through the windows. Steve and his friend believe that they had been watched while they were taking pictures and targeted due to their camera equipment.

They were gone for about 1.5 hours while they had dinner. The burglars took that opportunity to break out the window and grabbed the two camera bags, leaving the tripods and several other things, and ran off with the bags.

Because it occurred around 5:00 pm, it was still light outside and at that time of day, there was not a lot of foot traffic for people to see what was going on to scare off the burglars or raise the alarm of something wrong happening.

Steve and his friend did call the police, but since it was deemed a non-violent crime, the report was taken over the phone. A few days later, a detective followed-up with a phone call, and Steve was able to provide him with a list of all of the serial numbers of the equipment that was taken.

Steve had his equipment insured; his friend did not. In speaking with Steve about this event, he mentioned that his annual insurance was less than \$100 to have his equipment covered in the event of theft. His claim has already been paid, while his friend is filing a claim with his homeowners insurance, taking much longer, and subject to his deductible.

Police departments will typically distribute a list of equipment serial numbers reported stolen to pawn shops who will compare them to new items being brought in to be sold; conversely, they will also work with the pawn-shop owners to run serial numbers of equipment brought in to see if they have been reported as stolen.

As I discussed this story with my husband, Steve, he mentioned that his equipment had also been stolen from his vehicle back in the late 1980's. Since then, he has carried insurance on his equipment, kept an up-to-date list of his equipment serial numbers, and pays much more attention to his surroundings when he is out taking pictures.

Lessons to be learned from this experience:

- 1) It pays to have your equipment insured, which will require you to document your serial numbers and keep that list current in case you have to file a police/insurance report. Since we all carry our mobile phones with us, either keep the list in an app or create a document/ PDF that you send to yourself or download onto your phone so you have it readily available should the need arise.
- 2) Make sure you pay attention to your surroundings who is around you, what they are doing, how they are acting, and where avenues for exit are available should something happen.
- 3) Get in your car and drive away, put your equipment away off-site and then come back in without showing that you have valuables that might be of interest for would-be burglars.
- 4) If you think you have to make a decision on whether to store your equipment in your car before you head in to eat somewhere or to take it with you, think twice about putting your equipment out of your sight/control. Better safe than sorry!

The last question you should consider is: "What do I really need to carry in my bag?" Do you need EVERYTHING you bring with you?

I, personally, am really bad about carrying everything but the kitchen sink with me when I go out because I am always afraid I'm going to need something I left at home. So I know I have some work to do on paring down what I carry with me.


What can you do to prepare yourself and secure your belongings from theft? Something for all of us to think about....

Nature Photographers put their photography on the website, in coffee shops, in galleries, art exhibits, art shows, or online, but often struggle selling it. People love a beautiful image of nature, but aren't compelled to buy it for their home. Nature Photographers crave creating something different but often aren't sure how to execute new looks. There are interior design concepts that are unfamiliar to many Nature Photographers when we set out to make photographs. Photographers venturing out seeking the right light, action, moment, and composition, but often do not think first about the differing criteria for creating work appropriate for the various design elements of home or office interiors versus the classic criteria for magazines and calendars.



I am so thankful to the senior members who guided me on technical matters, training and also visiting many places to make great images.

After a couple of years using and learning basic photography skills with the entry level camera, I am now using Canon Mirror-less EOS R5 with some of their fantastic RF lenses.

THE SANCTUARIES

In April of this year, I was able to drive to High Island TX twice. If you are not familiar, <u>High Island</u> is located in the Bolivar Peninsula, Galveston County, TX. The community is located in the extreme eastern part of the county on Bolivar Peninsula, less than one mile from Chambers County and less than two miles from Jefferson County.

The <u>Houston Audubon Society</u> has 4 sanctuaries at High Island: <u>Boy Scout Woods</u>, <u>Smith Oaks</u>, <u>Eubanks Woods</u>, and the <u>S.E. Gast Red Bay Sanctuary</u>. Boy Scout Woods is the headquarters, which is staffed by volunteers during peak spring migration season from mid-March to mid-May. Smith Oaks is the largest sanctuary and home to the Rookery.

Smith Oak Sanctuary is famous among Birders and Photographers from all over the country and mainly famous for Roseate Spoonbills and if you visit, you will not regret, you will see many other categories of birds as well.

The club will be traveling to Caddo Lake to photograph brilliant fall colors of the largest bald cypress forest in the world. It is possible to photograph Caddo Lake from the shore, but it is not the best way. Most of the banks are located on private land and closed to the public. The best way to photograph the lake is by boat. We will have four boat tours scheduled, two sunrise tours, two sunset tours based out of the Shady Glade Marina located in Uncertain, TX. Members will have the freedom to choose some or all the tours.

- Boat tours will depart from Shady Glade Marina, Uncertain TX
- Boat tours have been arranged for two sunset tours and two sunrise tours.


