

MONSOON CHASING





ANITA OAKLEY

is this month's featured member.

Anita is a longtime member of Heard Nature Photographers - and was awarded an Honorary Life Membership in 2017. Anita joined the club in July 2008 and has served the members in a variety of ways. She spent years helping coordinate club field trips and has worked tirelessly on the annual photography contest. Anita helped the club get online with contest entries, opening the contest to a whole new audience. She has been featured with storm stories and a trip to Yellowstone in this Newsletter in the past. Most recently, she served as club president. Anita has gone storm chasing with Mike Mezeul II and most recently, monsoon chasing with Mike Olbinski.

As y'all know, I love chasing storms. Until this summer, I always chased supercells in the plains states – everywhere from Texas to South Dakota and a little bit over into Wyoming. Plains chasing is wonderful. I love the structure of the storms and the excitement as they speed toward you. But sometimes you have to drive five or more hours to put yourself into position for the next day's storms. In a typical week you may drive over 2500 miles. It can be exhausting!

This summer I decided to try something different. I'd heard that chasing monsoon storms in the desert southwest was different but also very enjoyable, so I signed up for a workshop with Mike Olbinski. You might be familiar with Mike's time lapse work, especially since he was our speaker in June. He does some great work, and a primary focus of this summer's workshop was learning time lapse photography. I had tried time lapsing a little bit in the plains, but had never concentrated on it, or been serious about learning it. After last month's workshop I will be doing a lot more of it.

I drove to Arizona rather than flying, partly because the airlines right now are a mess. But also, because I love the desert southwest and just wanted to enjoy the drive. I broke it up into two days to give myself time to putter along.

We were based in Tucson, in an AirBnB on a hill east of I-10 and north of the city. The place was beautiful and spacious, with a great view of the valley. This turned out to be great because we had a couple of nice storms move in while we were home, and two of my best shots were made on the back patio.

Chasing monsoon is very different than the plains. First of all, the chase area is much smaller. Essentially we chased between the New Mexico border and Phoenix, with most of the time between Tucson and Wilson, AZ. We spent the morning learning about time lapses and editing pictures, and left to chase somewhere between 11:00 AM and 1:00 PM. It was much more relaxing than chasing the plains.

During monsoon you aren't after tornados and supercells. Those are spawned by a combination of moisture, instability, and lift with the addition of shear – wind speeds and direction that differ with altitude. Monsoon storms lack shear, so they don't give you the twisting towers or tornados. What they do give you are beautiful cumulous clouds, prolific lightning, and occasional dust storms or haboobs.



During monsoon you aren't after tornados and supercells. Those are spawned by a combination of moisture, instability, and lift with the addition of shear – wind speeds and direction that differ with altitude. Monsoon storms lack shear, so they don't give you the twisting towers or tornados. What they do give you are beautiful cumulous clouds, prolific lightning, and occasional dust storms or haboobs.

Haboobs don't occur the way I thought they did. They start with an outflow boundary from a thunderstorm kicking up a little dust. As the outflow moves away from the storm, it kicks up more and more dust to add to what it already has. Eventually, you have a wall of dust moving ahead of the storm that is truly impressive. We raced ahead of one between Tucson and Phoenix, stopping three times to time lapse the different stages. Finally we went to a parking garage in Phoenix, hoping to get the wall moving over the city. Unfortunately, a rain curtain from another storm killed it as it hit Phoenix. Still, it was a great experience.

I was able to put my new skills into use on the way home. Some very pretty thunderstorms lined my way route all the way from Tucson to Pecos, Texas. I stopped several times to take dirt roads off I-10 and time lapse them.

My goals for the week were to get more comfortable with time lapse and come back with a great lightning shot or two. I wanted a haboob, but would have been happy without one. I got all three, plus a beautiful close rainbow and a sunset with saguaro cactus silhouette. Will I go back again? You bet!



GULF STATES CAMERA CLUB

The Gulf States Camera Club Council (GSCCC) was organized in Baton Rouge, LA in October, 1954. By the end of the first year, 25 clubs from Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Oklahoma and Texas made up the Council roster. Today 20 clubs from Louisiana, Mississippi, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Texas continue the organization and the convention tradition. North Texas camera clubs participating in GSCCC include ours, Plano, Dallas and Cow Town (Ft Worth). Annual conventions are held in the spring. They are hosted by member clubs from around the entire Council area. Convention events include the Council year-end competition, a photographic field trip, model shoots, and a day and a half of programs, ending with an awards banquet and a grand finale program.

IMAGE COMPETITIONS

The individual clubs submit images to GSCCC for competitions each month except December and April. In April the winning images from the prior year (May through March) are judged during the convention for the best of the year. Prior to the pandemic, both prints and digital images were judged. Currently all competition is digital until further notice. Four categories are judged,

- Photojournalism
- Nature
- Pictorial (Color)
- Pictorial (Black & While/Monochrome)

The images are uploaded by member club's GSCCC representatives (JD Luttmer for HNPC; <u>JDLuttmer@gmail.com</u>). Four images can be submitted monthly in each category, but only one image per person in each category.

Each digital entry must be a jpeg file with maximum dimensions of 1024 pixels in width and 768 pixels in height. There are no minimum pixel dimensions or file size limits. (Note: HNPC has submitted images as large as 4000 pixels on the long side without repercussions, but it's best not to push this). Image file names must use this format: Image Title~Photographer's Name.JPG, such as "Tangy Plunge~JD Luttmer.jpg".

ELIGIBILITY

Any photograph that wins a place (1st, 2nd, 3rd, 1HM, and 2HM) in any GSCCC monthly competition is ineligible for entry again in any category. A winning image may not be reversed and entered again. Photographs that do not place in a GSCCC monthly competition may be re-entered in any future GSCCC competition.

The same image cannot be entered in more than one category in the same competition.

Winners of 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 1HM, and 2HM of each category in GSCCC monthly competitions are eligible to be entered in the same category in the annual End-of-Year competition. No images receiving awards from previous years are eligible to enter.

PHOTO CATEGORY GUIDELINES

I. PHOTOJOURNALISM

Photojournalism entries shall consist of images with informative content and emotional impact, reflecting the human presence in our world. The journalistic (story-telling) value of the image shall receive priority over pictorial quality. In the interest of credibility, images that misrepresent the truth, such as those from events or activities specifically arranged for photography or of subjects directed or hired for photography, are not eligible. Techniques that add, relocate, replace or remove any element of the original image, except by cropping, are not permitted. The only allowable modifications are removal of dust, scratches or digital noise, restoration of the existing appearance of the original scene, sharpening that is not obvious, and conversion to greyscale monochrome. Derivations, including infrared, are not eligible.

2. NATURE

Nature photography is restricted to the use of the photographic process to depict observations from all branches of natural history, except anthropology and archeology, in such a fashion that a well-informed person will be able to identify the subject material and to certify as to its honest presentation.

The story telling value of a photograph must be weighed more than the pictorial quality while maintaining high technical quality. Human elements shall not be present, except where those human elements enhance the nature story. The presence of scientific bands, scientific tags or radio collars on wild animals is permissible. Photographs of artificially produced hybrid plants or animals, mounted specimens, or obviously set arrangements, are ineligible, as is any form of manipulation that alters the truth of the photographic statement.

No techniques that add to, relocate, replace, or remove pictorial elements except by cropping are permitted. Techniques that enhance the presentation of the photograph without changing the nature story or the pictorial content are permitted. All adjustments must appear natural. Color images can be converted to grayscale monochrome. Infrared images are not allowed.

I. COLOR

Anything goes in Color/Pictorial. Images that fail to meet one of the guidelines for Nature category will be considered for the Color category

2. BLACK & WHITE/MONOCHROME

An image is considered to be Monochrome only it if gives the impression of having no color (i.e. contains only shades of gray which can include pure black and pure white) OR it gives the impression of being a grayscale image that has been toned in one color across the entire image (For example sepia, red, gold, etc)

A grayscale or multi-colored image modified or giving the impression of having been modified by partial toning, multi-toning or by the inclusion of spot coloring does not meet the definition of monochrome and shall be classified as a Color Work.
