

THE ACCIDENTAL FLOWER PHOTOGRAPHER



NANCY MACK is this month's featured member.

Photography Club and the Dallas Camera Club. She has been a Fulbright Scholar to Japan as well as to the Netherlands. She is relatively new to photography, only picking up a camera seriously when she retired in 2014. Her first love is tapestry weaving and she has been a member of the Dallas Handweaver's Guild for 40 years. She is also the Heard Newsletter Editor for 2021 and 2022.

Although I was an art professor for 38 years, I was never interested in mastering darkroom chemistry. My husband and I have traveled to some of the most beautiful places in the world and I have albums of terrible snapshots to prove it! Digital cameras seemed a bit less daunting and I have always been on the quest for a perfect flower for my tapestry weavings, which have often taken the shape of Japanese kimonos.











I weave on both an <u>AVL computerized loom</u> for patterned pieces,







and an upright Glimakra tapestry loom (left) for pieces with pictorial imagery. Here is a paper "cartoon" (center) which acts as a visual pattern for creating a tapestry tonal image (right).

Over a 30 year period, most of my tapestries have taken the form of Japanese kimonos. Many are now installed in office reception areas in the US.

I have attended workshops with <u>Helena Hernmarck</u>, one of the most influential tapestry weavers in Europe and the US. She has developed a special technique for creating photographic images in her <u>gigantic tapestry murals</u>, which are woven completely on <u>large</u>, <u>manual tapestry looms</u>.















I have also studied with <u>Cathryn Amidei</u> who creates <u>landscape tapestries</u> on the <u>Digital Norway TC2</u> <u>computerized Jacquard loom</u>. This loom was created for prototyping and sampling for the textile industry, but has become an important artist's tool for creating photorealistic weavings. The process involves selecting an image, editing it in an industrial Jacquard loom software package - including Photoshop, - transferring that edit to the loom controller software and weaving the image. Thus the scene that the Renaissance tapestry weaver took years to finish, is now only limited by the weaver's output per hour! Needless to say, the cost of the loom is equivalent to buying a mid-priced car! (My color images below, sampled in B/W above.)

I finally gave up the film camera and the point-and-shoot and invested in a real camera. My daughter-in-law explained the Exposure Triangle and f-stops and I took a course at Collin College, some online classes and joined a club.

My son-in-law enjoys cooking (I think he likes shopping at Williams Sonoma even more..) and invested in the very expensive "The Art of Modernist Cuisine" series. The photos are fabulous. Browsing a bookstore one day, I discovered "The Photography of Modern Cuisine". This 13-lb volume - which accompanies the cook book - introduced me to "focus-stacking" photography. My weaving hobby went by the wayside. I spent the next few years exploring how to do this with flowers. Flowers from grocery stores. Flowers from my garden. Flowers from my neighbors' gardens. Gifts for mom: send flowers to photograph!

focus-stacking technique

Soft - software for capturing individual photos from the nearest to the furthest focal point and the companion software for merging these into a final sharp front to back image.

The goal was not photography. I needed a "<u>cartoon</u>" that I could place behind the warp threads on the loom and ultimately weave into a tapestry.

And how many of these photographs have I woven??? Not a single one. I am too busy take photos of flowers. My looms are sadly idle.

Images were captured indoors in <u>Helicon Remote</u>

- starting at the closest focusing point and finishing at the furthest focusing point.

This resulted in 25 images (five seen above.)

These RAW images were taken into Lightroom and exported to <u>Helicon Focus</u> and processed. They were saved as .dng files and the final image edited in Lightroom. I took the image into Photoshop to clean up blemishes on the petals.



GREETING CARD DESIGNER

by ROB HULL

It's getting to be that time of year when you want to share your artistry with friends and family. I'm talking about creating your own greeting cards, it's a powerful and unique way to share your work.

Once you understand the process, greeting cards can be designed and printed quickly. But be forewarned, you need to do a little homework first. Also, remember that we are talking about using your own inkjet printer, not sending them out to a lab.

First I'll share with you the steps necessary to create a card from scratch in Photoshop. And then, I'll share with you some actions that automate the process.

Before you get started

Before you march headlong into Photoshop you need to understand a few key limitations for laying out greeting cards.

Greeting cards are usually printed on special paper stock. Like standard photo papers, you can purchase greeting card stock in glossy or matte finishes or even elegant artistic papers. These papers, however, are scored to accommodate the fold and are cut in unusual dimensions that will result in standard folded dimensions. For example, if you wanted a 5" x 7" greeting card, the pre-scored stock will be 10" x 7".

This brings us to our most important limitation. Because greeting card stock is usually cut to non-standard dimensions, there are few printers that have the capability to print borderless images using these papers. You'll find that even with a printer that is advertised to print borderless, the feature is limited to specific standard sizes such as $8'' \times 10''$, $5'' \times 7''$ and $4'' \times 6''$. Because of this you need to allow for a non-printable margin on all sides of the card.

The size of this margin depends upon the minimum margin for your specific printer model. To find this look in the printer reference manual for the section that describes the Printable Area. The sample above is for an Epson photo printer and you'll see the minimum margin is 3mm or 0.12". We'll use this for our sample card.

Lay Out Your Card

Now that you have all the printer specifications and know the size of the greeting card you want, it's time to open an image and create a card. In our sample card, we are going to create a $5'' \times 7''$ card and prepare it for a printer that has a minimum margin of 0.12''. The card stock is $10'' \times 7''$.

Open the image that you want to use for the card. It's a good idea to do a File > Save As... to save the greeting card using a different file name.

Select the crop tool and crop your image using the following tool options;

Width: 6.76 inchesHeight: 4.76 inches

• Resolution: 300 ppi (or whatever you use for your printer)

Now we'll add the unprintable margin by using the Image > Canvas Size... dialog; enter the following options;

Width: 7 inchesHeight: 5 inches

• Keep the Anchor in the center

Canvas extension color: White

Now that the front of the card looks good, it's time to add the portion that will become the back of the card. Once again, we use the Image > Canvas Size... dialog box but this time we change the anchor point. Where you move the Anchor point depends upon whether you are creating a portrait style or landscape style card. In the Landscape Style sample above we move the Anchor point to the bottom. This will create a fold above the image. (For a Portrait Style card, the Anchor point would be moved to the right.) In the dialog box use the following options:

Width: 7 inchesHeight: 10 inches

Anchor: Move it to the bottom center

Canvas extension color: White

Once complete, you're ready to print your card. You'll need to follow your printer's directions to know how to load your card stock to ensure that your image is printed on the proper side of the paper. When you are done, you will have a beautiful greeting card ready for mailing.

Greeting Card Stock

If you're looking for card stock on which to print your images, click on over to the Red River Paper website. They have a tremendous assortment of greeting card stock, from Glossy and Luster cards to 100% cotton fine art papers. My personal favorite is their 60lb. Polar Matte and I've basically standardized on the 9" x 6.25" size. I've printed our family Christmas Card on this stock for over 10 years.


Help Laying Out Cards


