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

October 7th

We will make up the postponed June field trip to <u>Lewisville Lake Environmental Learning Center</u>. Anita Oakley leading. Meet at 8:00 by the pavillion. With over 6 miles of hiking trails, LLELA is positioned where the Blackland Prairie mingles with the dry upland forests of the Eastern Cross Timbers. The Elm Fork of the Trinity River, with its surrounding bottomland forests, winds through the middle of these two ecosystems.

Why Attend a Workshop? Anita Oakley



I'm a firm believer in photography workshops. I've been attending them since 1998, and have found them invaluable for many reasons. If you are on the fence about attending a workshop or photo tour, here are a few reasons I think there is no better way to improve your art.

Reignite your passion for photography.

Photographer's burnout is a real thing. Every once in a while, I just lose the urge to go shoot. Nothing sounds appealing. But on a workshop, enthusiasm is contagious. I come home excited about my craft all over again.

Practice new skills and techniques.

As much as I always wanted to get into storm photography, I probably never would have gone without the tornado alley tours I took with Mike Mezeul II. And if I did go out there, I would have taken much longer to learn the

skill set for lightning and supercells. I learned how to eliminate lens flare on a Kauai workshop. I learned focus stacking on a workshop to Death Valley. I learned soft flower techniques from John Shaw on my first workshop - in a 1998 Disney Institute class.

Receive valuable feedback on your work.



Most workshops include at least one critique session. You can get honest opinions from the leaders and the

other participants, helping you improve your photography. You also can get hands-on help with your post-processing.

Go to new exciting locations with someone who knows it well

I've found that workshops also enabled me to go places I would never have gone on my own, including Kenya, Svalbard, and South Georgia Island.

Also, have you ever taken a trip to a great location, had a wish list for the shots you wanted, but found that you were there at the wrong time of day, or even worse, the wrong time of year? When you take a workshop, the leaders know the areas well. They know what time of day is best, they watch the weather and vary the itinerary based on the conditions. It frees you to do your best work.

Meet new people who share your passion for the art of photography

I have made so many friends from all over the world on these trips! The bonds you make on your workshops can last far beyond the end date. And



every one of those people are as passionate about photography as you are!

The State of Maine and iPhone Photography Lee Hatfield

On the west, Maine is bordered partially by Quebec Provence and by the state of New Hampshire on the west and southern state line. Maine has 30,843 square miles, 3,500 miles of jagged coastline, over 6,000 lakes and ponds and over 17 million acres of forests. Interstate 95 runs basically north from the New Hampshire-Maine state line at Kittery to Houlton International Airport on the border with New Brunswick. All other main roads are state or county roads and are generally only two lanes altho Route 1 from the college town of Brunswick to Bath is four lanes. I-95 and Route 1 are the gateways to the towns and peninsulas of the coast.

You can fly into Boston's Logan Airport, rent a car and be in Maine in about an hour, or you can fly into Portland, Maine, and avoid the hassles of getting out of Boston and paying huge airport rental fees. Flights will also take you to Bangor International Airport where you can rent a vehicle and be in Bar Harbor on Mount Desert Island and Acadia National Park in about an hour.

Maine hosts over 10 million visitors every year and Acadia National Park hosts 4 million visitors each year. Be sure to book ahead for hotels, B&B's, cabins or cottages especially if you plan to arrive during June, July, August or October as these months are prime tourist times. Check out Acadia NP's webpage for the latest

rules and regulations before you go. This summer everyone had to purchase a special vehicle pass to drive up Cadillac Mountain - it was only \$6.00 but could only be purchased two days before you wanted to go, had to be purchased in advance, not at the checkpoint, and it was a timed entry pass. Be sure to make time to drive to Schoodic Point which is near Winter Harbor and further up the coast from Acadia. It is part of Acadia NP and seldom very busy, has some great trails and terrific crashing waves.

Altho I own two Nikon cameras and several lenses, I have been using just my iPhone 13 Pro Max for photography the last couple of years of traveling. It has nearly all the options I want, is easy to carry and I don't get back or neck pain carrying it plus editing and sharing images is easy and quick. I can further edit on my laptop with Photoshop if I choose to make a book or have them printed on canvas as images are 56" x 42" and a minimum of 25MB or more. I have it set to upload to iCloud everyday so I can access my images from my iPad and laptop. Now, if I want to photograph the Milky Way rising or birds flying or airshows, I'll take my Nikons, but for vacation shots, my iPhone is what I carry. I take advantage of the various settings and options including portrait mode where you can change the depth of field from f2.0 to f16. You can select features from Natural Light to High-Key Light Mono, plus you can shoot in panorama mode, time lapse or slo-mo. It's all about just playing and seeing what the various settings can do for you.

Linda and I had the opportunity to participate in a May photography workshop in northern Italy. The tour was led by pros William Yu (https://www.williamyuphotoworkshops.com/) and Lorenzo Nadalini and included three other enthusiasts. Lorenzo drove us around in a large van and was quite familiar with iconic locations that are

popular with photographers. Little walking was required to get to the photo locations. The marvelous inns where we stayed were usually within a 30-minute drive of our best sunrise and sunset locations. The Italian food and wine were wonderful as expected.

The farmlands of Tuscany are the most photographed landscapes in Italy, so of course we encountered several other photography groups while there. But there was plenty of room for all, and all appeared respectful of others and the private lands.

The bad news was that it rained every day we were there, primarily afternoon storms. The good news is that it rained every day we were there! The weather made for dramatic skies, rainbows, saturated colors and cool temperatures – a marvelous combination.

Many locations offered great photo opportunities both at sunrise and sunset. The light and the weather would often change rapidly, so we had to be on our toes. Other than a bit of jet lag, the only issue I had was a bit of sleep deprivation. We tried to get sunrise and sunset images every day, and then we dined together late in the evening. This enabled a measly 5 hours of sleep each night!

I shoot with a Canon R5 mirrorless camera, and used both a Canon RF 24-105 lens and a Canon RF100-500 lens in Tuscany. I rarely needed a lens wider than 24mm, so stitched images when I did. A few images required focus stacking. Photo processing was done using Lightroom, Photoshop, Topaz Denoise AI (when needed) and Helicon for focus stacking. I find the latter works much better than Photoshop for stacking. And of course I needed Linda's help color correcting some of my images due to my protanomaly.

If you have not had the opportunity to visit Tuscany, I highly recommend it for landscape photography. It is easy to get there, easy to get around and it is stunningly beautiful!
