



Topic:

A Technophile's Path to Becoming a Better Nature Photographer



This talk will provide an understanding of the various tools and techniques I've explored in order to hone my abilities and eye as a nature photographer. I'll focus on both the things a photographer can do with the camera itself and also the animal- and area-specific research necessary before going into the field. Items I will cover may include light consideration, choosing the right lens, using tools like <u>eBird</u>, (Cornell Lab of Ornithology), Flickr and even social media to find animals to shoot, assembling gear, and the post-shoot cull.

I have been an avid lover of the outdoors since I was a child walking through the woods around Scranton, PA. As I grew up, that appreciation for nature expanded to a specific interest in the animals that call the outdoors home. I began taking pictures as a hobbyist four years ago with no specific goals or expectations other than to marry my enjoyment of animals and their behaviors and habitats with my equally keen fascination with technology and specifically all the ways a camera could be manipulated to create pictures that reflected how I feel in nature. Since that time, I have taken post-graduate classes, attended international photography shows, spoken to photography groups, and challenged myself to hone my craft so that my hobby has matured into a potential second career.

Some of my favorite photography locales have included the Oregon coast, Death Valley, the Pine Barrens, Amsterdam, the Everglades, and a wide range of locales in northern Colorado. I shoot with Olympus and I remain a dedicated studier - and collector - of the many gadgets, gizmos, and geegaws that salve the technophile in me, while also expanding my photography toolkit.





Guy is our Membership/Marketing Coordinator.

Guy has made two trips to Big Bend. The first was an expedition with the Heard Photography Club in October, 2019. The second was a <u>Jeremy Woodhouse</u> workshop in March, 2021. This review is from both trips. We will work from East to West.



The Grand Big Bend Tour

The east most part of the tour is the <u>Crowtown Movie set</u> constructed in 1985 for the movie "Uphill all the Way". The site has been used as a set for nine movies including John Sayles' 1996 movie "Lone Star"; as well as "Dead Manís Walk" and "Streets of Laredo" miniseries.

Next is <u>Closed Canyon</u> formed by a seasonal stream flowing from the desert land beyond has cut a narrow canyon right through, just 10 to 15 feet wide and enclosed by sheer, vertical walls up to 150 feet high. This is Closed Canyon, one of the best features in the state park, and one which is very easy to explore since the entrance is just a few minutes walk from the road and there are no major obstacles until near the end, when the canyon floor has several vertical drops, one requiring a rope to descend safely.

The flash flood danger is real during heavy rains, and there are no escape routes once past the entrance!



In September 2008, heavy rains and flooding occurred in Ojinaga, Mexico. The rain, and the ensuing release of water from local flood control structures, caused widespread flooding, and resulted in damage to the movie set buildings at the Contrabando. The original Casita was not damaged. In 2015, the buildings, except for the Casita, were removed for safety reasons.





If we had stuck around long enough we might have seen a grand sunset!

This is a composite from the sunrise behind us. It's a good view with a better sky.


Sunrise at the Santa Elena Canyon Trail.

Numerous exotic barbary sheep (also known as aoudad) which are native to North Africa and the deserts of the Middle East and Asia, now inhabit Big Bend National Park. Founding animals were stocked on private game ranches in Texas, and reproduction and expansion allowed them to invade the park. They have likely been present since the 1970's and now occur parkwide. Aoudad compete with native desert bighorn sheep, and threaten the restoration effort to bring previously extirpated bighorn sheep back to their native land.





Luna's Jacal, not much else out here

Luna, lived in this self made jacal in the middle of the desert for over 60 years. Raised a family there and lived to 108! Off the main roads but drivable. One of the most interesting sites in Big Bend!

This small 3-4 foot high building is Gilberto Lunais Jacal (a Jacal is a wattle and daub structure used as a home, typically found in the Desert Southwest).

Gilberto Luna built his Jacal some time around 1900 and lived and raised a large family there until his death at 109 years of age in 1947. Some accounts say that he raised upwards of 58 children and step-children, with most being raised in Mexico, prior to him moving into the Big Bend Area.

Lunaís Jacal is made out of limestone and sandstone blocks with a large flat boulder at the rear of the building. The roof is made out of ocotillo branches held up by larger poles. It was placed on the National Register of Historic Places on November 8, 1974. In reviewing their records online, it says that the use of soil cement on the roof was "discordant and blatantly not a faithful restoration of the structure," but you will get the idea of what it is supposed to look like when you go visit.

One thing you will notice when you go inside is the temperature difference. With his Jacal built into the ground like it is, the temperature varies fairly dramatically between the hot sun outside and the cool shade on the inside.

Mr. Luna eked out a living here by irrigating the land with floodwater diverted from the nearby Alamo Creek. Since rainfall is such a rare occurrence in Big Bend National Park, a large part of his time was spent hauling water for his crops in a mule-drawn wagon from a spring several miles away. The water was collected in an old oil drum, and upon his return, each plant watered individually from a gourd dipper to conserve water. (Source: Exploring the Big Bend Country, by Peter Koch and June Cooper Price)

Observing a Butte through Ocotillo blossoms. This plant is also known as a Candlewood or Coach Whip plant.

While semi-succulent and a desert plant, Ocotillo is more closely related to tea and blueberries than to cactuses.

Uses:

- 1. Individual ocotillo stems are sometimes used as poles as a fencing material in their native region, and often take root to form a living fence.
- 2. Due to their light weight and interesting pattern, ocotillo branches have been used for canes or walking sticks.
- 3. Fresh flowers are sometimes used in salads and have a tangy flavor.
- 4. Flowers are collected, dried, and used for tisanes or Herbal Tea.
- 5. Bathing in water that contains crushed flowers or roots has been used to relieve fatigue.
- 6. Native Americans place the flowers and roots of ocotillo over fresh wounds to slow bleeding.
- 7. Ocotillo is also used to alleviate coughing, achy limbs, varicose veins, urinary tract infections, cervical varicosities, and benign prostate growths.

Northern Mockingbird in Sam Nail Ranch

In 1916, Sam Nail built a two-room adobe house on the banks of Cottonwood Creek. He soon married, and he and his wife raised a family there. Today, you can wander through their homestead. Look for the remains of the original house, its adobe walls melting back into the desert. Sit in the shade of the orchard and look for remnants of their garden. Find the chicken coop shaded by soapberry trees. Imagine a day when the old, wooden windmill pumped water up to a tank on the top of Burro Mesa for the Nail's cattle.

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A Most Peculiar Yucca

Upper Burro Mesa Pour Off Trail, Big Bend:

This is a chaparral Yucca with a very strange cork screw growth pattern Almost all the others had straight stalks. But there were a few like this. I wouldn't be surprised to find an insect involved.




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Balanced Rock, Grapevine Hills Trail

Distance: 2.2 miles round trip

Begin 6 miles down Grapevine Hills improved dirt road at the parking area

This trail leads to a group of balanced rocks in the heart of the Grapevine Hills. Initially, the trail follows a gravel wash, then climbs steeply for the last quarter mile into the boulders. The last section requires crossing steep, rough bedrock, and negotiating a challenging landscape of boulders. Stay on the trail, and watch carefully for the directional arrows that point the way to the balanced rock. Use extreme caution, especially coming back down. No shade, watch for snakes!

Coming down for Breakfast at the Chili Pepper

This picture is obviously heavily processed. The original is a blah, grey early morning picture. It didn't capture the mood of the entrepid trekers. This captures the mood!

The overlook of the deep V-Shaped Window is also one of the best places to watch the sunset in Big Bend National Park because the rock cliffs form a silhouette in the foreground with the colorful twilight sky in the background.

Darn! The crossing is closed! Clive can't go there. This gate was fabricated by one of the rangers with extra time on his hands.

Boquillas is a small village in Mexico that sits on the Eastern side of Big Bend National Park. The community features an international port of entry to cross the Rio Grande. It is advisable to arrive back at the port of entry 30 minutes before closing time. The doors will be locked promptly at closing time.

Most visitors enjoy a meal at one of the two local restaurants. Jose Falconís restaurant has been a mainstay of the local tourism business for many years. They have recently expanded and have a very pleasant atmosphere overlooking the Rio Grande. Immediately across the street is Boquillas restaurant, operated by another branch of the Falcon family. The food in both places is simple, fresh, and good.

The length of the Rio Grande is 1,896 miles (3,051 km) and originates in south-central Colorado, and flows to the Gulf of Mexico.

After traversing the length of New Mexico, the Rio Grande becomes the Mexico-United States border, between the U.S. state of Texas and the northern Mexican states of Chihuahua and Coahuila, Nuevo Leon and Tamaulipas; moreover, a short segment of the Rio Grande is a partial state-boundary between the U.S. states of New Mexico and Texas. Since the mid-twentieth century, only 20 per cent of the Rio Grande's water reaches the Gulf of Mexico, because of the voluminous consumption of water required to irrigate farmland (e.g. the Lower Rio Grande Valley) and to continually hydrate cities, such water usages are additional to the reservoirs of water retained with diversion dams.


